



Kansas ObamaCare Poll

**500 Likely 2014 General Election
Kansas Voters
August 22-25, 2014**

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Methodology

The Foundation for Government Accountability commissioned an auto-dial telephone survey of 500 likely 2014 general election voters in the State of Kansas between Friday, August 22 and Monday, August 25. The poll was conducted by Advantage, Inc. A random sample of likely voters was polled, with “likely voter” status being assigned to those voters with high participation rates in the past several general mid-term elections. The poll has a margin of error of 4.38%.

Topline Results

Question 1

In the last several state and national elections, which party candidates have you typically voted for?

Mostly Republican	57%
Mostly Democrat	22%
Some Republican/Some Democrat	22%

Question 2

In the November 2014 General election are you likely to vote for a candidates who are:

Mostly Republican	54%
Mostly Democrat	21%
Some Republican/Some Democrat	25%

Question 3

How do you feel about the Affordable Care Act, otherwise known as ObamaCare? Are you:

Very Supportive	17%
Somewhat Supportive	14%
Somewhat Opposed	12%
Very Opposed	57%

Question 4

In the upcoming November election, how will a candidate's position on ObamaCare impact your decision to vote for him/her?

Strongly impact	59%
Somewhat impact	27%
Will not impact	14%

Question 5

What is your gender?

Male	48%
Female	52%

Question 6

It has been reported by the media that more than 6 million people had their own insurance plan cancelled due to ObamaCare. If true, how would this affect your level of support for the law? Would you be:

Much more supportive	11%
Somewhat more supportive	15%
Somewhat less supportive	15%
Much less supportive	59%

Question 7

In order to pay for ObamaCare, the law calls for \$716 billion in cuts from the Medicare program, putting services for seniors at risk. How does this affect your level of support for the law? Does it make you:

Much more supportive	8%
Somewhat more supportive	12%
Somewhat less supportive	15%
Much less supportive	65%

Question 8

Many people argue that ObamaCare forces them into being treated unfairly by mandating that they buy expensive health insurance or be penalized through taxes while certain groups like unions, big for-profit companies and members of Congress are exempted from the penalties. How does this argument affect your level of support for the law? Does it make you:

Much more supportive	9%
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Somewhat more supportive	13%
Somewhat less supportive	14%
Much less supportive	64%

Question 9

Before ObamaCare was passed in 2010, the President and Congressional ObamaCare supporters claimed that if the law passed, individual health insurance premiums would decrease an average of \$2,500 per family per year. In fact, they have increased by an average of \$3,000 per family. How does this fact affect your level of support for the law? Does it make you:

Much more supportive	10%
Somewhat more supportive	13%
Somewhat less supportive	9%
Much less supportive	68%

Question 10

ObamaCare regulations require individuals to provide financial and health-related information to the IRS and five other governmental agencies including the Departments of Homeland Security and Justice. Do you trust the IRS or other governmental agencies to protect your personal information and financial records given to government agencies as part of the ObamaCare legislation?

Completely trust the government agencies	11%
Somewhat trust the government agencies	13%
Somewhat distrust the government agencies	16%
Completely distrust the government agencies	59%

Question 11

In the upcoming November election, how likely are you to vote for a candidate who supports ObamaCare?

Very likely	19%
Somewhat likely	9%
Somewhat unlikely	12%
Very unlikely	61%
